

September Meeting: Convergence Review, Guild Sale, and Reclaiming Yarn from Old Sweaters

We met at Susan Hainsworth's home for our first meeting of the new Guild year: 2018-2019. Susan welcomed everyone and discussed the upcoming workshop in October on **Woven Shibori, taught by Barbara Cabrol**, a former Guild member. Susan welcomed new members: Patricia Walton and Cynthia Gray. Then some of the Guild members who went to Convergence in Reno reported on their experiences:



Maureen Wilson reported on a seminar she took from Robyn Spady on several weave structures that she called "Wicked Good Weaves," which translates into "very good weaves." These weaves included one that Robyn called "better than basket," a 6-shaft basket weave that can be found in Mary Meigs Atwater's *Recipe Book* and Mary Black's *Key to Weaving* as a true basket weave. This weave makes beautiful towels.

Next up was **Catherine Marchant**, who took an inkle weaving class from Daryl Lancaster, and a three-day Rep Weave class from Rosalie Neilson, producing a beautiful table runner. Catherine also told us about a project called Women's Woven Voices, started by Brechia Kralovic-Logan, to give representation for women's lives from around the world and a catalyst for collaborating on solutions to the issues that women face. Deanna Baugh, who attended both Convergence and Complex Weavers Conference, told us about her time there, attending several seminars by Robyn Spady: Discussion on Weaving Names, Gadgets, and Gizmos, and the Bateman Collection Weaves. She also took a class on joining pin weave pieces from Roseanne Anderson, and a three-day class, again from Robyn Spady, on parallel threadings, using one threading for several weaves, including corkscrew twill, shadow weave, turned taquete and a weave from the Echo (parallel) and Iris (iridescent). Lone Star Loom Room offers a scarf kit in parallel threading and Cotton Clouds has a towel kit by Sarah Jackson, if you want to give either of these a try.

Sonya Campana presented the beautiful Shibori samples that she dyed with natural dyes in her three-day workshop. The next Convergence will be held in 2020 in Knoxville Tennessee – start saving for it now.

Then Catherine Marchant, Sam Kievit, and Maureen Wilson discussed pricing for the upcoming **Guild Holiday Sale (November 16 and 17)**, the Guild's first sale in a long time. Catherine recommended checking pricing sources such as Etsy online for values. Sam mentioned a few examples where artists sold more when they raised their prices. Check with others who are weaving for the sale on what they are charging for their pieces. Catherine then reviewed the Consigner's sheet and labeling requirements for sellers at the Guild Holiday sale. She distributed a sign-up sheet for volunteers, with details on setting up, working at the sale, and cleanup. Send any contacts for the sale postcards to Catherine or Susan Hainsworth.

After our potluck lunch, we had the privilege of hearing Ann McKane teach us how to reclaim yarn from sweaters. This was a fascinating demonstration, showing us how to carefully take apart the seams of a sweater and "reclaim" as much of the yarn as possible. Ann has a lot of beautiful yarn that she has gotten from old sweaters. We thank Ann for sharing this new skill with us! **Maureen Wilson**

Shuttle-Craft Bulletins: Christmas Weaving


As the October issue of the Shuttlecraft Bulletin has been dedicated to Christmas Weaving, in 1931 and 1933, Mary Meigs Atwater wrote similar articles on weaving for Christmas, whether it be for gift giving or for sale (think Guild Holiday Sale, November 16 and 17). Mary wrote that weaving gifts was particularly important in the 1930s for those feeling the financial Depression, but wished to delight friends and family with gifts. She thought that the Depression had stimulated activity and given a new appreciation of values, resulting in more planning ahead for gift giving.



It was Mary's opinion that gifts should have beauty, combined with utility to carry the message of affection. Consider this when you are weaving items for sale at this time of year. She emphasized planning, by using the same warp for as many articles as possible. She recommended, for instance, a fine natural linen warp as a starting point. With a linen weft, towels, napkins, and table linens could be woven. With rayon, pillow tops, runners, and wall hangings could be produced, and with wool, upholstery fabric (which would make an interesting gift indeed). A silk weft would make a very satisfactory bag. A cotton warp would be a good alternative, and Mary suggested it be tan, old gold, taupe, or pearl grey in color, not a stark white. Mary provided several "plans" in 1931 for warps, with a list of the pieces each of them would provide. For example, a 20"-wide, 20-yard, 16/2 cotton warp could weave 5 yards curtain fabric, 6 large bags, 4 square pillows, 4 table runners, resulting in 15 gifts!

The design provided in 1931 could be woven in several ways: a 4-shaft crackle weave, 5-harness Summer and Winter, and a 7-shaft Summer and Winter in 2 colors. She recommended these weaves for rugs or fabrics that could be used to cover boxes. She also gave a brief description of a card weaving that could be used to cover picture frames. Diagrams of these were included.

In 1933, Mary wrote on gifts of a more personal nature, such as scarves in fine wool woven in Bronson spot weave, neckties, and belts. Scarves in large plaid or check patterns were in style as well. She described woven bags as a flat purse type with a zipper closing and a strap. She recommended Summer and Winter, Crackle, and Bronson weaves. She referenced several threadings from the Recipe Book, recommending them for scarves, ties, and belts as well as pillow tops, table linens, and rugs. She provided a card-weaving draft for hat band and matching belt. She also provided two drafts in spot Bronson with borders for napkins – one of them is provided here. These would work well for towels too, I think. There are, as always, a lot of options. So, start planning and weaving. *Maureen Wilson*



The Shuttle-Craft Bulletin Study Group


